"Flourish", you will remember, used to be sold at the stall before the pandemic. It is the monthly newspaper of the Archdiocese of Glasgow but I have always found it a very readable and interesting

publication and I have already sent in my request for a subscription.

It appears that the **Scottish Catholic Observer** has become a casualty of the pandemic and will not re-appear so, *Flourish* is now Scotland's only Catholic newspaper and the new edition is out this weekend.

"Mother, behold your Son"

Would like to place on record my gratitude and the gratitude of all devotees of the grotto to Ross Henderson who recently fabricated and donated the metal sign above Our Lady of Lourdes in the grotto. Ross very generously volunteered to design, make and erect this sign free of charge. The previous sign had to be removed a few years ago as it had rusted and disintegrated over the years. Ross has his own company 'Electric Gates, Scotland'. And operates out of a workshop near Harthill. It is thanks to Ross and many others like him that the grotto has flourished through the generosity of craftsmen over the last one hundred years.

PRAYING WITH OUR BODIES

I couldn't help but notice in the church, last weekend, the Feast of the Body and Blood of the Lord (Corpus Christi) how many people entered and left the church without any acknowledgement of the Blessed Sacrament. I am sure no disrespect or intentional lack of reverence was intended but it did occur to me to mention what you see on the front of this bulletin, and to reinforce again the importance of expressing our beliefs in the way we pray —





including using our bodies. I am sure that this is a message to which I shall return when the holy water stoups are allowed to be used again. It is amazing how quickly people get out of practice at some things they would have done without evening thinking. No doubt, I will feel obliged to mention the Catholic practice of blessing ourselves with holy water upon entering and leaving the church. (On that note, am I the only one who thinks it a bit bizarre that we are now allowed to swim freely in a swimming pool but not permitted to dip a few sanitized fingers into a holy water stoup? Yes, I appreciate that swimming pools have chlorine and all sorts of chemicals, but just the same...)

Anyway, since there is ample space in this week's bulletin, I thought it would be a good idea to remind ourselves that we pray as much with our bodies as with our tongues. This is a message that I have been trying to get over to the Primary school children coming to Mass on weekdays.



Nowhere is this more relevant than when we speak of the Most Blessed Sacrament. Over the last two weeks when I have been returning to the church with the Blessed Sacrament after the Masses, I specifically asked for Christopher to ring the bell announcing to all in the grotto that the Blessed Sacrament was passing by. Some did fall to their knees or stand quietly, but just as many carried on their conversations and one young person even chose to answer his mobile phone just as I was passing in front of him. The phrase "they know not what they do" seems apt, for there is no intentional disrespect. The much more casual way we can now receive Holy Communion (i.e. standing and on the hand) has had an unfortunate side-effect of lessening the reverence which used to characterise our approach to Holy Communion and reverence for the Blessed Sacrament Himself.

So, for better or worse, here is some guidance as to what is required of us by the Church and Catholic tradition.

It is part of our Catholic tradition to KNEEL:

- Whenever we come into the church—we kneel in humble adoration of the Blessed Sacrament
- Upon returning from Holy Communion, we kneel to give thanks to God for his great gift of the Eucharist.









This was re-emphasised when the new translation of the Mass texts were introduced in 2010, but alas, has had limited success in most parishes.

ALSO

BEFORE receiving Holy Communion we are invited to

GENUFLECT or BOW or make a SIGN OF THE CROSS.

Genuflect or Bow or Make the sign of the Cross
